This Infernal War: The Civil War Letters of William and Jane Standard (Kent State University Press, 2018)

This is an edited collection of letters exchanged between

a Union soldier campaigning in the Deep South and his wife in Lewistown, Illinois, from the fall of 1862 through the summer of 1865. The letters illuminate how the Civil War affected marriages and families, and the relationship between homefront and battlefront.

Are you originally from west central Illinois? No, I grew up in Tallahassee, Florida.

Who inspired/encouraged you to write? My 9th grade English teacher! I wrote a review of Dickens' *A Tale of Two Cities* that she read aloud to the whole class. Wow.

Why did you decide to write this book? It fit my teaching and research interests, and was unusual in that both the husband's and the wife's letters still existed. In most Civil War correspondence only the soldier's letters home survived.

Have you written other books? Titles? <u>Distant Revolutions: 1848</u> and the <u>Challenge to American Exceptionalism</u> (2009); <u>American Exceptionalism</u> (2014)

What is the best/hardest part of writing? The best part is seeing a narrative take shape bit by bit, and arranging a narrative to solve a dilemma on how to keep the story flow going. The hardest part is starting writing, which requires tuning out lots of distractions, and resisting the urge to multi-task.

What advice would you give to an aspiring writer? Write about something that at some level is about yourself or your personal experience. All writing at some level is autobiographical.

Of the nearly \$7,000 that was taken in during the sale, \$775 of that was from avid readers who either took out new memberships or renewed their previous memberships on Thursday. The weather cooperated Friday and Saturday and there was a steady strain of bargain hunters finding good books.

The Friends of the Library continue to

appreciate your interest in "recycling" your books and providing new merchandise for future sales.

While many took advantage of the opportunity to deliver donated books to the Annex in July, we encourage you to to also drop off your book or media donations any time at the front desk in the library during their open hours. Proceeds from the book sales are invested in the public library and support the children's summer reading program, duplicate copies of current popular books, as well as other needs as specified by the library.
